
gers creating the first in the world, Northeast Master Logger Certification program.

IMPACT—Your Legislative Update

IMPACT in this format will touch briefly on areas of legislative interest. For detailed status or updates visit the PLC website (www.maineloggers.com) under the News tab.

LD 1552 and LD 1545 – Bonded Labor Legislation —These two bills have worked their way thru the legislature. They prohibit the use of bonded laborers and impose tax penalties on land owners who use bonds. LD 1552 – passed both houses and now goes to the Governor. Indications are that the Governor will sign the bill, meaning the bill will become law 90 days after the final adjourn-

ment of the legislative session.

LD 1545 – which increases the fines for non-compliance, has not yet come before either house but is expected to before the session ends.

BCAP Comments—PLC has provided comment to the USDA regarding proposed rule changes in the reauthorization of BCAP. There is still time for members to email or fax comments. Increased Truck Weight Limits—As you know the truck weight limits on I-95 have been increased for one year on a pilot basis. Congressman Michaud is still seeking positive stories and comments on benefits of the pilot from citizens and businesses in an effort to make the change permanent. PLC has made a comment but additional comments are encouraged. Additionally, we would like to remind members, as always, to continue operating in a safe and courteous manner on the highways during this pilot program.

Safety First!

Safety First is no joke, from protecting your most valuable asset—your employees, SmartLogging audits, or the bottom line dollars saved through the PLC/ Acadia Dividend Program, remember...safety starts with you!

The Safety First! Section will be used to highlight Corrective Action Requests (CARs), provide safety tips and areas of concern.

Corrective Action Request

Although we have always performed well relative to the safety standard – our auditor really drove a point home – that even if it's something we're used to seeing - if it looks dangerous, it is dangerous. And there has to be a better way to do it.

Logging operations must have written harvest plans on site. Each harvesting operator should have at hand a map or written directions guiding the harvest he/she is conducting.

A written harvest plan is required by the SmartLogging standard even if not required by the landowner. Ask the landowner, contractor or forester on the job to supply you with that documentation. A written harvest plan must be prepared for all harvest operations.

To assist loggers with corrective action requests, TCNEF created the "Harvest Integrity System" (HIS Template). This can be used as drafted or as a model for harvest planning, including pre— and post— checklists. All members have been mailed a copy of the HIS. If you would like a copy it can be found on our website or mailed to you.

This template meets all SmartWood Smart-Logging requirements. The members who did not have these in the past now utilize this format. In some instances the member's existing plans more than adequately met the standard.

Do not be outside of a vehicle while wood is being loaded. At one point a driver was actually on the trailer while it was being loaded. He also worked between the trailer and the forwarder while it was loading the trailer, and he moved underneath a log as it was being loaded.

Log Loading—Are you meeting OSHA Standards?

Did you know, we have a very different way of loading and transporting here than anywhere else in the county? Anywhere else a "log truck" is not a flatbed and doesn't require people at the landing outside of the vehicles. OSHA regulations require loading practices that do not involve people on the landing, outside the cab of a truck or vehicle.

A good place to start with rethinking loading on your landings are these three actions:

- Establish eye contact and a designated "ready" signal between mobile machinery operators and truck drivers working together to load or unload a truck
- Conduct regular safety training and retraining for hazardous work environments
- Conduct a site hazard assessment, which should include a documented job safety analysis and disciplinary process.

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Industry Intel—What's up in logging today—

New York—AMERICAN FOREST & PAPER ASSOCIATION (AF&PA)

released its 50th Annual Survey of Paper, Paperboard, and Pulp Capacity. Reporting that the U.S. paper and paperboard capacity declined 2.5 percent in 2009 to 93.9 million tons. Paper and paperboard production is rebounding from the recession-induced lows reached in early 2009. The Survey reports total paper and paperboard capacity is expected to decline 3.4% in 2010 and then remain essentially stable in 2011 and 2012.

Augusta—Elizabeth Townsend was sworn in as Maine Conservation Commissioner on March 23rd. She served as acting commissioner since Patrick McGowan vacated the spot in January to run for governor. Before joining the Department, Townsend was executive director of the Maine League of Conservation Voters and the Maine Conservation Voters Education Fund. She served previously as a state representative.



KENNEBEC WOODLANDS PARNTERSHIP—

The Maine Forest Service and Kennebec Land Trust launched a regional forestland conservation initiative, the Kennebec Woodland Partnership.

The program will draw on a diverse pool of foresters, small woodlot owners, loggers, biologists, economists, municipal planners and community members to craft a collaborative vision for keeping forest as forest in Kennebec County. The partnership will provide an opportunity to exchange information through the network. It will culminate in a three-day workshop October 21-23, 2010. SOURCES—The new wood-pellet boiler at the City of Gardiner's Public Works garage is a showcase for the quality and reliability of alternative energy, according to boosters of the technology. Long used to heat homes and businesses in Europe, Gardiner is the first municipality in Maine to use a wood-pellet boiler system. With energy costs rising many stress the benefits, one being refueling the forest economy and keeping the profits in Maine. The project cost \$75,000, far more than a simple replacement of the old oil-fired system, officials said. But as oil becomes more expensive, the payback could be reached within a decade. GPS (Global Positioning System) technology is a tool that loggers can use to navigate forestland, as well as collect GPS data related to boundary lines, access routes, forest stand types, and riparian zones. This technology can be used to improve harvest layout and planning. During the workshop learn GPS basics and get hands on experience, collecting waypoints, tracts, and measuring acreage on the ground, download GPS data collected in the field and view the data. GPS will be provided for use during the workshop. During the session learn how to create electronic maps, use the GIS system to take area and distance measurements, obtain aerial photos, topographic maps, and other data that can be viewed in a GIS.
