LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

ALC SUMMER BOARD OF DIRECTORS' MEETING

Presented by Henry Schienebeck, Chair

The legislative and government affairs environment in 2025 is an unmatched opportunity to advance the ALC agenda. The current Administration has elevated the timber industry regularly through statements, policy, Executive Orders, and trade negotiations consistently. The ALC and its members are responsible for much of the Administrations attention and positions. The ALC Road Map to Recovery has established the national narrative regarding many of these issues.

To leverage this opportunity the ALC is investing additional resources of time, money, lobbying, and presence in DC, including ALC President Mike Albrecht and his wife Vicki spending significant time in DC representing the timber industry.

SAFE ROUTES

- Introduced in the House of Representatives by Congressman Wied (WI) on March 14, 2025 and referred to Committee.
- Introduced in the Senate by Senator Johnson (WI) on March 13, 2025 and referred to committee.
- The Agriculture and Forestry Efficiency Act was introduced by Congressman McGuire (VA) as his first bill on February 21, 2025

Meetings have been held with Secretary of Transportation Sean Duffy's staff to discuss this issue and explore administrative actions to allow interstate access. Secretary Duffy introduced the Safe Routes when he was a Wisconsin Congressman.

FUTURE IN LOGGING CAREERS ACT

- Introduced by Congressman Golden (ME) and Congressman Thompson (PA) who is also the Chairman of the House Agriculture Committee on February 11, 2025 and referred to Committee.
- Introduced in the Senate by sponsor Risch (ID) and cosponsored by King (ME), Collins (ME), Crapo (ID), Cornyn (TX), and Sheehy (MT) on February 11, 2025 and referred to Committee.

MODERN, CLEAN, AND SAFE TRUCKS ACT (FEDERAL EXCISE TAX REPEAL)

- The Federal Excise Tax Repeal has been introduced in the House of Representatives by Congressman LaMalfa (CA) and cosponsored by Pappas (NH), LaHood (IL), Carbajal (CA), Miller (OH) on March 28, 2025.
- Senator Moreno (OH) attempted to add an amendment to the Big Beautiful Bill to reduce the Excise Tax to 2% but it failed to be included. Senator Moreno has pledged to continue pursuing legislation to reduce the excise tax to 2%.
- There is no Senate companion bill.
- Congressman LaMalfa's office reports that the Chairman of the Transportation Committee is looking to require a car and truck registration fee to offset the revenue loss to the Highway Trust Fund.

FIX OUR FOREST ACT

- Introduced in the House and passed with bipartisan support.
- Introduced in the Senate by Senator Curtis (UT) on 4-10-2025.

The House bill was 180 pages long and the Senate bill is 15 pages long. So there are obvious fundamental differences that will have to be worked out in Conference Committee if and when it passes out of the Senate.

The ALC has attended and observed the Senate Hearings.

SECURE RURAL SCHOOLS

Secure Rural Schools represents expired legislation that provides funding to communities, including schools, that have been impacted by the loss of revenue from reduced federal timber sales.

Legislation to reestablish funding has bipartisan support and was pursued through the Reconciliation Bill, but the Parliamentarian ruled it ineligible due to procedural issues.

The impacted communities are rural timber communities. Henry Schienebeck has been leading this effort from the timber side and has acknowledged that Toni McAllister has provided strong support through her connections to Speaker of the House Johnson with keeping the SRS in the forefront of Congress.

EUROPEAN UNION DEFORESTATION REGULATION (EUDR)

The European Union Deforestation Regulation (EUDR) is an overreach of foreign governance attempting to dictate U.S. land use and private property rights. Additionally, it is a non-tariff trade barrier that puts U.S. forest products at an economically competitive disadvantage. The U.S. Trade Representative's Office has declared the EUDR as one of the top ten non-tariff trade barriers to U.S. industries. Significant opposition from other countries to the EUDR exists.

A major setback to the EUDR occurred within the European Union when their Parliament voted down the proposed country benchmarking classification system. Part of the opposition was a push to establish a zero-risk category for countries like the U.S. that do not have a deforestation problem. This setback brings into question the future viability and requirements of the EUDR.

The ALC has received documentation of U.S. mills requiring logger compliance with the EUDR before it is even required or the processes agreed to. The ALC has shared this documentation with the White House and U.S. Trade Representative's Office. The ALC's position is that the U.S. needs to inform that there is not a deforestation issue in the U.S. and that we will not be subject to foreign government dictates regarding land management and private property rights.

Short of that, there needs to be a zero-risk category for the U.S. without any land use restrictions.

NORTHERN LONG-EARED BAT

The Northern Long-Eared Bat (NLEB) listing as endangered has created at the very least enormous uncertainty as to the impact to forest management activities. Administered by the Department of Interior, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, there is inconsistent compliance direction, processes and requirements.

The ALC has had multiple meetings with the USFWS in DC and Virginia. The ALC position is that the NLEB needs to be downlisted to threatened. Alternatively, with the current Administration's proposal to remove "habitat" as a harm consideration, forest management activities should be exempt.

LOGGERS ECONOMIC ASSISTANCE AND RELIEF ACT

Senator Collins (ME) and Congressman Golden (ME) have reintroduced the Loggers Economic Assistance and Relief Act to establish a payment program for unexpected loss of markets and revenues to timber harvesting and timber hauling businesses due to major disasters and for other purposes.

The ALC secured co-sponsorship in the House from Congressman Stauber (MN) to provide bipartisan House support.

The guidelines will be similar to the Pandemic Assistance for Timber Harvesters and Haulers (PATHH) program which the ALC was instrumental in developing.

SECTION 301 INVESTIGATION OF BRAZIL'S UNFAIR TRADE PRACTICES

In conjunction with the Section 232 Investigation of Canadian lumber imports, the U.S. Trade Representatives Office announced the opening of a Section 301 Investigation of Brazil's Unfair Trade Practices, specifically including "deforestation" and "undermining the competitiveness of U.S timber producers".

While the primary focus of lumber imports has been on Canada, representatives of the southern states (Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, and Mississippi)

initiated attention on imports from Brazil during meetings with the Commerce Department at the Spring DC Fly-In. As a result, the importation of plywood and pulp from Brazil was brought to the forefront of the Administrations attention and likely led to this action.

The ALC issued a Press Release supporting the Administrations Section 301 Investigation, with quotes from southern timber representatives.

JOBS IN THE WOODS ACT

The Jobs in the Woods Act was introduced this week by Congressman Rouzer (NC) and Congresswomen Marie Gluesenkamp Perez (WA). This legislation would connect young people with rewarding careers and training in forestry-related fields.

The program would create educational opportunities through grants (\$500,000 - \$2,000,000) to create programs in rural and low-income areas to spur economic development; create a pool of talented, trained and qualified applicants in forestry-related industries; and partner with successful proven programs to assist with job placement.

These issues are part of the Road Map to Recovery and will continue to be addressed through the ALC ongoing work in DC.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

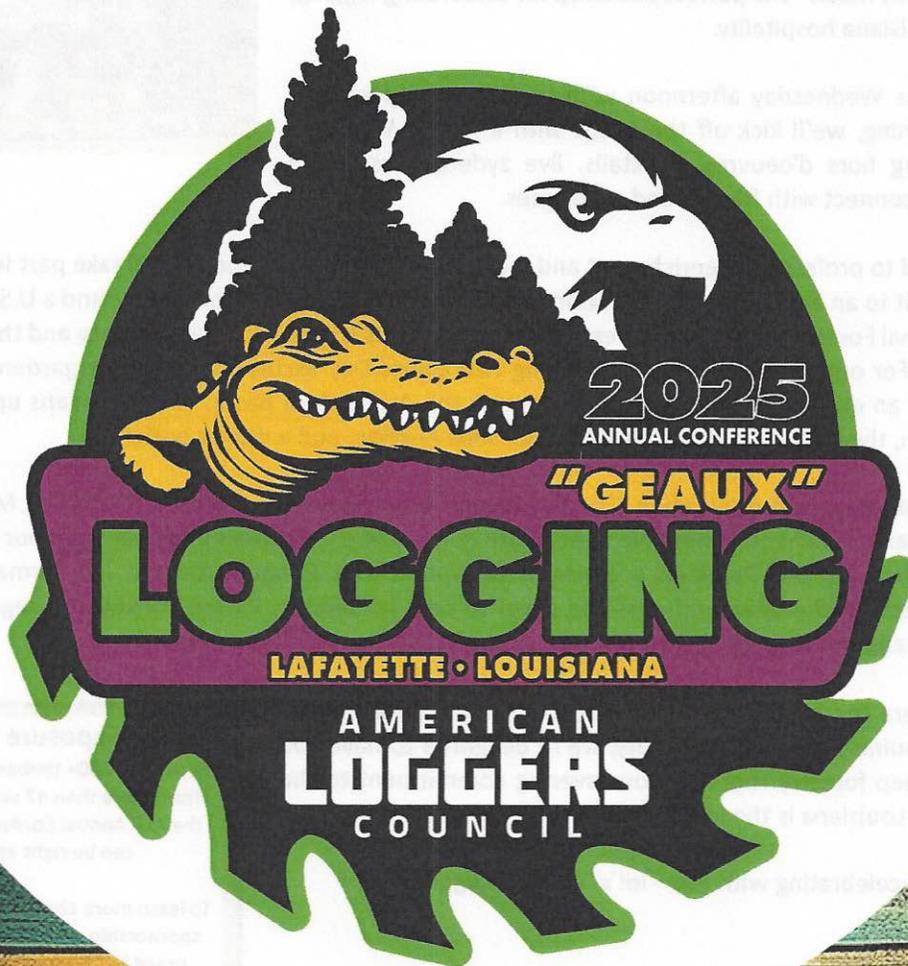

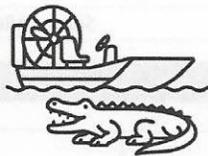
